



GOVERNMENT RESPONSE TO MODERN SLAVERY

The scale of modern slavery

According to the Global Slavery Index 2023, an estimated 7.6 in every thousand people were in modern slavery in Lebanon at any point in 2021. In other words, 52,000 people experienced forced labour or forced marriage in Lebanon in 2020. Lebanon ranks 45th globally and 6th within the Arab States.




Vulnerability to modern slavery

How vulnerable a country's people are to modern slavery is dependent on a range of factors which reflect the strength of governance, access to basic needs, inequality, disenfranchised groups, and effects of conflict. On a scale of 0 to 100, with 100 being the highest vulnerability to modern slavery, Lebanon is rated as 60 and has above average vulnerability for the region. Vulnerability is highest in terms of disenfranchised groups.

Vulnerability of Lebanon to modern slavery by dimension of vulnerability, compared to the regional average






Government response to modern slavery

The government of Lebanon scored 33 out of 100 in their response to modern slavery. This places the government's response below the average regional response. Of the five areas of response assessed (milestones), the government has taken most action on national and regional coordination of the response to modern slavery and the least action on addressing risk in government and business supply chains.

Priority Recommendations for the government of Lebanon:

- Remove laws or policies that prevent or make it difficult for workers to leave abusive employers without risking loss of their visa, deportation, and/or loss of security deposits.
- Criminalise forced labour in line with international conventions.
- Criminalise commercial sexual exploitation of children in line with international conventions.
